The Board of Lincoln County Commissioners met at 9:00 a.m. on December 30, 2024. Chairman Steve Burgess, Commissioners Wayne Ewing and Doug Stone, County Administrator Jacob Piper, County Attorney Stan Kimble, Clerk of the Board Corinne M. Lengel, and commissioners-elect Terry Jaques and Robert Safranek attended. When the meeting started, Steve and Marsha Sitton, Jan Schifferns, Glen Cox, and CSU Extension Director Wayne Miller were in the audience.

Chairman Burgess called the meeting to order and led the Pledge of Allegiance. Mr. Ewing said a prayer.

The Sittons, Mrs. Schifferns, and Mr. Cox were there to discuss the Bovina Cemetery, how selling the surrounding property would affect it, and the Arriba Cemetery District's maintenance. First, Mr. Kimble addressed that there had been a question about the formation of the Arriba Cemetery District. He noted that, years ago, landowners brought a petition to the county commissioners who, if they approved, adopted a resolution forming the district. Lawmakers created cemetery district statutes in 1981; before that, cemeteries fell under the guidelines of special district statutes. Mr. Kimble felt that a 2001 Certificate of Purchase between S.L. Sitton and the Arriba Cemetery District indicated that the district existed. However, the commissioners should adopt one if Mr. Piper couldn't locate the resolution forming the Arriba Cemetery District.

Mr. Sitton said his parents paid to publish a book about the Bovina Cemetery, including the first recorded burial in 1888. The book provided the cemetery's location in Section 7, Township 9 South, Range 53 West of the 6th P.M. but described it simply as "...outside the fenced railroad right-of-way...situated on a hill east of the town and overlooking Hackberry Creek." Mrs. Schifferns noted that all the Arriba Cemetery District board has is a map.

Mr. Kimble asked if there was a conflict among landowners, but the Sittons own all the property surrounding the cemetery; they wanted to know what would happen to the cemetery if they decided to sell their land. Mr. Kimble suggested obtaining a survey to describe the cemetery easily and asking the commissioners to adopt a reconfirmation resolution. They wouldn't want to say there wasn't a previous resolution, which was why it was a reconfirmation. He noted that it seemed like an easily solved problem.

Mrs. Schifferns asked what would be necessary for the Arriba Cemetery District board to continue maintaining the cemetery. Mr. Kimble said if it were a statutory cemetery district, the county commissioners should appoint the board members, as they do the Karval Cemetery District members. Mr. Piper said he'd run across letters from 2007 and 2015, where the commissioners appointed board members; however, they hadn't appointed anyone since. He wondered if board members served until there was a vacancy.

Mr. Jaques asked about access, and Mrs. Schifferns said they wanted to continue accessing the cemetery property to mow and take care of it if the Sittons sold the surrounding land. Mr. Sitton noted that it was on a section line and asked if it required an easement; Mr. Kimble told him that cemetery statutes include easement provisions.

Mrs. Schifferns stated that she, LeRoy King, and Glen Cox are the board members and offered to submit the resolution appointing them. Mr. Piper told her a list of members would suffice for the Board Appointments the commissioners would approve at the reorganization meeting on January 14, 2025.

Mr. Ewing wanted to address Mr. Jaques' question about access, and Mr. Kimble said it could be a provision for the resolution. He felt the Board's only obligation was to ensure the district's formation and appoint board members. Still, he reiterated that the commissioners should reaffirm the cemetery district's existence rather than assume it never existed.

The Sittons, Mrs. Schifferns, and Mr. Cox left, and the commissioners met with CSU Extension Director Wayne Miller at 9:15 a.m.

Mr. Miller provided a job description and qualifications for an administrative assistant, including the base pay at Level 3, Step 1: \$3,508 monthly. Mr. Miller planned to post the ad in the Limon Leader, Mile Saver Shopper, and on the county and CSU Facebook pages. Mr. Ewing asked him to conduct in-person interviews, and Mr. Miller said he would. Mr. Piper noted that internal transfers wouldn't necessarily require an interview but could.

Mr. Stone moved to approve the Extension office Administrative Assistant job description, and Mr. Stone seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

Mr. Stone moved to approve a county credit card for Wayne Miller with a \$3,000 credit limit. Mr. Ewing seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

Mr. Ewing moved to approve the meeting minutes for December 18, 2024. Mr. Stone seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

Mr. Burgess wanted to wait for Mr. Lorensen before reviewing agenda item three, so the commissioners reviewed the 2025 Lincoln County Pay Schedules. Mr. Piper said they all included the two-step cost of living increases, which was the only change to the sheriff's. He had moved the Public Health Program Manager from Level 2 to Level 3 on the forty-hour pay schedule to reflect the promotion requested by Director Kelly Meier. He also changed the title on Level 8 of the Human Services pay schedule (37.5 hours/week) to include the Lead Worker. Lastly, Mr. Piper removed the Extension Program Assistant from Level 4 and dropped it to Level 3 to coincide with other Administrative Assistant positions. He commented that CSU Director Dennis Kahn felt it should be a Level 2 position.

Mr. Stone moved to approve the 2025 Lincoln County Pay Schedules, and Mr. Ewing seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

Lincoln County Sheriff's Corporal Coley Britton and Human Services Director Andrew Lorensen arrived at 9:35 a.m. Mr. Lorensen explained that he'd been the representative on the Juvenile Services Board for the 18th Judicial District for the past several years. The commissioners must

sign a resolution creating the Juvenile Services Board for the new 23rd Judicial District. Mr. Lorensen said the JSB oversees the CYBC (Colorado Youth Detention Continuum) director and budget, including detention costs and management. He said they would maintain the same contracts and continue to use the Foote Youth Services Center and the JAC (Juvenile Assessment Center) in Centennial.

Mr. Jaques asked if the county housed juveniles. Corporal Britton responded that the sheriff has a six-hour window to process juveniles and must separate them by sight and sound; however, they can use video/audio. He noted that a juvenile had to commit a class 1 or class 2 felony before the law would confine them to a juvenile detention facility. The corporal said law enforcement could not restrain a juvenile with handcuffs or leg shackles unless a court order allowed it.

Mr. Ewing moved to sign a joint resolution between Douglas, Elbert, and Lincoln counties, creating a 23rd Judicial District Juvenile Services Board. Mr. Stone seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

Corporal Britton left at 9:45 a.m., and Mr. Burgess recessed the Board of County Commissioner meeting and opened the Lincoln County Board of Human Services meeting. DHS Director Andrew Lorensen presented his monthly report. The Board reviewed the November financial statements, the Income Maintenance report, the Child Welfare and Adult Protection reports, and the director's monthly reports.

Lincoln Health CEO Kevin Stansbury arrived at 9:50 a.m.

Mr. Lorensen informed the Board that they still had \$20,000 in LEAP outreach money and \$20,000 in Family Voice grant funds to spend. He wanted to temporarily increase the limit on his county credit card to pay for some of the items that were 100% reimbursed rather than purchase a few items each month.

Mr. Ewing moved to temporarily increase Andrew Lorensen's credit limit to \$10,000 for January and February 2025 and reduce it again in March. Mr. Stone seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

After Mr. Lorensen left, the chairman adjourned the Board of Human Services meeting and reconvened the Board of County Commissioners meeting.

Mr. Stansbury gave his monthly report at 10:00 a.m. Mr. Burgess asked for a status on the Lady Bird Park property; Mr. Stansbury said the hospital has it and plans to use it for a trauma staging area.

Mr. Stansbury admitted that November was a hard month financially, but the year-to-date finances were still doing okay. He spoke briefly about the new facility, Resource Recovery Audits, and rural capital needs. They must reintroduce the Hospital Revitalization Act to the

119th U.S. Congress in 2025. Mr. Stansbury said Craig Hospital wanted to amend the bill to allow non-elected officials on its board and to change budget submission deadlines to December 1 rather than mid-September. Mr. Piper said it shouldn't affect him much as long as they submitted preliminary figures.

Mr. Ewing asked about food service for the jail; Mr. Stansbury said he would have to discuss it with Sheriff Nestor for 2026. He noted that LCH would do it for cost and could prepare and deliver meals to the jail.

The group briefly discussed highway access to the new facility; Mr. Stansbury said he'd given up the idea of accessing it from Highway 40/287.

Mr. Stansbury wished the group a happy new year and left at 10:15 a.m.

Land Use Administrator Ty Stogsdill arrived at 10:20 a.m., as did Chris Wicken, Alyssa Metzger, and Michael Cross.

At 10:30 a.m., the Board conducted a public hearing on Development Permit #24-05 to allow Chris Wicken to construct a $60' \times 70'$ steel storage shed on a parcel in south Limon at State Highway 71 and County Road 3E. No one else attended the hearing, which Mrs. Lengel recorded. The hearing recording will remain in the County Clerk's vault for the statutory period.

The Land Use Board met and unanimously approved the permit application with no additional conditions; however, they did ask if Mr. Wicken planned to install electricity. Mr. Wicken said he would look into it, feeling it was a good idea. Mr. Stogsdill noted the property must have an address before Mountain View Electric Association would install a meter.

Mr. Ewing moved to approve Development Permit #24-05, and Mr. Stone seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

Mr. Wicken left, and since it wasn't time for the next public hearing, Mr. Piper provided copies of the proposed personnel manual updates. He noted some cleanup items regarding FMLA, the addition of a time limit for employee exit interviews, a workers' compensation law change, and a recommendation from the county's insurance carrier regarding telework, particularly out-of-state. Mr. Burgess asked if teleworking based on office policy meant that the commissioners had control over DHS or other department policies. Mr. Piper said DHS had a separate handbook in addition to the county personnel manual that the commissioners had the right to review. He added that the Board sets office policies for those departments the commissioners supervise.

Mr. Ewing moved to approve the personnel manual changes, effective on January 1, 2025. Mr. Stone seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

Sheriff Tom Nestor, Assessor Jeremiah Higgins, and Victor Johns arrived at 10:50 a.m.

Mr. Burgess called for commissioner reports. Mr. Ewing reported attending the employee Christmas/appreciation party on December 19. Afterward, he attended the Lincoln Health finance and subsequent hospital board meeting, where they recognized Mr. Burgess and Mr. Stone for their years of service to Lincoln County. Mr. Ewing also checked several county roads. He attended the District 1 Christmas party on December 20, checked roads, stopped at the county shop on December 24, and again checked roads on December 29.

Mr. Stone attended the employee appreciation/Christmas party and hospital meetings on December 19. He later attended a meeting at BOCES. District 3 had its Christmas party on December 24, which Mr. Stone attended. He checked some western roads on December 27 in response to a complaint.

Mr. Burgess reported that for the week of December 18 through 26, he went to the hospital board meeting, had the District 2 Christmas party at the Genoa shop, and received a call from Steve Sitton about the Bovina cemetery. Mr. Burgess contacted Mr. Kimble to discuss it, and Mr. Sitton sent Mr. Burgess paperwork showing that his father had purchased some lots. Mr. Burgess noted that, according to Leroy King, it is part of the Arriba Cemetery District.

Mr. Burgess also reported that a landowner called about putting up a fence on County Road 3H west of State Highway 71. He and Bruce Walters looked at it on December 26; it is an unmaintained county road. One section of the fence was on the property line, and Mr. Burgess wasn't sure they could make them move it for the county's sixty-foot right-of-way. He felt a cattleguard was the best option, but it would be up to the landowner to speak with other landowners about fixing their fences and installing a cattleguard.

On December 27, Mr. Burgess and Mr. Jaques looked at County Road 3H. Mr. Burgess called the landowner, who met them there and agreed that a cattleguard would be best. Mr. Burgess also logged into the Land Use meeting to see how the new meeting owl worked but disconnected so he wouldn't hear the discussion.

Public Health Director Kelly Meier and DHS Director Andrew Lorensen arrived at 10:57 a.m.

At 11:00 a.m., the Board conducted a public hearing on Development Permit #24-06 to allow Michael Cross and Alyssa Metzger to put a house on 40 acres in the NE4; 32-6-52. No one else attended the hearing, which Mrs. Lengel recorded. The hearing recording will remain in the County Clerk's vault for the statutory period.

Mr. Stogsdill said the property had an existing house, but it was unlivable, and they would add a new water well, septic system, and leach field. The Land Use Board unanimously approved the application with no additional conditions.

Mr. Ewing moved to approve Development Permit #24-06, and Mr. Stone seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

Deputy Treasurer LaRay Patton and Shawn Ashmore arrived as Mr. Cross and Miss Metzger left. Mr. Burgess said he'd asked the department heads to come to the meeting to thank and honor Mr. Kimble for serving as the county attorney; he presented a clock in appreciation.

The department heads (except for Mr. Stogsdill) left at 11:07 a.m., and Brad Vice arrived shortly after.

The Board reviewed a proposed resolution for Donald Johns's exemption from subdivision regulations. Mr. Stogsdill said they'd been waiting since October for the surveyor to record the survey plat; Mr. Burgess would need to sign it if the Board approved the exemption. Mr. Johns wanted to subdivide 5.70 acres for his daughter to live on; there would be no change to the property use.

Mr. Stone moved to adopt a resolution approving an exemption from the Lincoln County Subdivision Regulations for a 5.70-acre tract in the NW4 of Section 10, Township 14 South, Range 59 West of the 6th P.M. for Donald Johns. Mr. Ewing seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

Mr. Vice asked if he would have to obtain another survey and follow the same process if he sold the Quonset in the future; Mr. Burgess told him he would, and Mr. Vice and Mr. Stogsdill left at

11:25 a.m.

Mr. Kimble reported receiving payment from the landowner that damaged the District 2 right-of-way. Mr. Burgess said he'd received a complaint from a neighboring landowner that the same person was dumping trash and tires in the Arikaree creek bed. Mr. Kimble advised that if they could prove the party violated state statute or county ordinance, they could obtain an order to clean it up.

Mr. Kimble had received sample resolutions from CDOT regarding the devolution process of the right-of-way at County Road T and State Road 71; he promised to send them and the Arriba Cemetery information to Kelly Lowery.

Mr. Piper reported that while attending their winter conference, the hotel mistakenly charged a couple of personal credit cards instead of county cards; he asked the group to check their statements and let him know if it happened.

Mr. Piper had also received a letter from LaRay Patton listing people interested in serving on the Fair Board.

As for old business, Mr. Burgess said he'd discovered that the commissioners had been discussing the new landfill cell since 2018. He wondered if the county spent more money than necessary prolonging the discussions and project with Mark McMullen and American Environmental Consulting.

There was no new business to discuss, so the Board approved the December payroll and 2024 expenditures.
